

The Asian Medical Students' Conference was initiated in 1980 by the Association of Japan Medical Students with the cooperation of Ramathibodi Medical Students International Affairs committee of Mahidol University,

Bangkok, Thailand. In the subsequent years, the number of participating countries has increased and cooperation from other medical schools in Asia has been very encouraging. The first three conferences were held in Bangkok, the 4th in Kuala Lumpur, the 5th in Singapore and the 6th in Manila.

The 7th AMSA conference was held in HongKong last year. The theme then was: 'Mental Health in Asia'. About 150 students from 10 countries did participate in the last conference. The participants were from Australia, Republic of China, Indonesia, Japan, Kuwait, Malaysia, Philippines, Singapore and Thailand.

The conference offers the best opportunity for Asian Medical Studdents to exchange their views and ideas on current medical issues facing Asian nations apart from promoting social interaction and cultural interflow. It is the ideal place to share our different esperiences in dealing with medial matters under different social contexts.

As in the past, each country is to present a paper concerning a specific and relevant topic. The theme for this year is: 'Is The Medical Curriculum of Your School/Country Suited for the Year 2000'. It is felt that this is one of the more important issues facing the medical students today.

THE STUDY OF INTERNATIONAL HEALTH

PRIMARY HEALTH CARE IN THAILAND

AMDA Japan members are examining the details of participating in a Primary Health Care field study being arranged by The ASEAN Training Centre for Primary Health Care Development (ATC/PHC), Mahidol University, Salaya Campus, Nakornpathom Province, Thailand which plays the role of responsible organization to prepare the schedule and make other necessary arrangements for this field study.

Objective of the study is: To enhance the understanding of medical and health related students/ personnel for International Health on the following topics:

- 1. Health services delivery system in Thailand
- 2.  - 3. Social problems and the new integrated rural development stratagies on Basic Minimum Needs and Quality of Life (QOL) campaign

The study programme includes the following schedules:

- a) Orientation to Mahidol University, ATC/PHC and Orientation to the study programme
- b) Introduction to PHC in Thailand, Introduction to Rural Development and Thailand
- c) Cultural tour in Bangkok
- d) Field study in Bangkok slum areas
- e) Visits to Governer's Office, Provincial Medical Office and Regional Hospital
- f) Village study
 - g) Report of Village study and Recommendations
 - h) Pleasure trip to Pattaya Beach

Besides the above schedule, there will be Reception Party and Fare-well Party at ATC/PHC which will be specially arranged in the honour of the field study participants.

AMDA Japan, a branch of AMDA International, is objected to promote the development of PHC together with partners in each Asian Country; persuing improvement in health care level of Asian people and "Better Medicine for a Better Future in Asia". More investigation and implementation of PHC is felt necessary both in the developing and developed countries including Japan.

There are also plans of taking part in another field study at Comprehensive Comunity Health Programme (CCHP), University of Philippines System, Bay, Laguna in Philippines which may be specially arranged by Dr.Octavious P. Daoa, who is the officer-in-charge of CCHP, Bay, Laguna.


